



Making Room for Wildlife Wildlife at the Eric East Lake Nature in Turmoil

This quote is from an article on the BBC website in late December.

"The loss of predictable weather pat-ber. terns is "causing chaos" for nature, according to the National Trust."

"It warns climate change is upsetting the regular rhythm of the seasons, making plants and wildlife more susceptible to disease."

The evidence is all around the village and in our gardens. In December we had roses in bloom and in January we had a self seeded cowslip in flower in our lawn.

Why? Again from the BBC website:

"The year 2023 has been confirmed as the warmest on record, driven by human-caused climate change and boosted by the natural El Niño weather event.

Last year was about 1.48C warmer than the longterm average before humans started burning large amounts of fossil fuels, the EU's climate service savs.

Almost every day since July has seen a new global air temperature high for the time of year, BBC analysis shows."

Storms - The Eric East Lake

You will have noticed that storms are named alphabetically. For this season the storm names are: Agnes, Babet, Ciaran, Debi, Elin, Fergus, Gerrit, Henk, Isha, Jocelyn, Kathleen, Lilian, Minnie, Nicholas, Olga, Piet, Regina, Stuart, Tamiko, Vincent and Walid. No storms begin with the letter Q, U, X, Y and Z to comply with the international storm naming conventions.

At the time of writing, the most recent storm was Henk ie the 8th since September. No doubt your gardens have suffered from the strong winds and relentless rain - for 2023, we had about 150% of our normal annual rainfall and most of that fell from September to the end of the year. to, sent to me by a village resident, is a prefect example. They can contain many thousands of starlings - an estimated 25000 on this occasion.

Connectivity

I have been invited to talk to the Eagle and Swinethorpe Parish Council about Wildlife Friendly Community status. I am hoping to do the same with Doddington and Whisby Parish Council. This could really open up our potential connectivity from our gardens, fields, hedgerows, school, church, Golf Centre and so on to four adjacent villages. I've estimated this to have an area of about 10 square miles. Google tells me that's over 3600 football pitches!

Thorpe-on-the Hill - History

Eagle's. This very grainy print of a photo- operating the crossing on 30th May 1972. graph appeared some years ago in the house magazine 'Wyvern' of the Midland Railway Trust which is a preserved railway running steam and diesel trains near Butterley in Derbyshire. The centre preserves and operates all things related to the Midland Railway which was, until the nationalisation of the railways to become British Railways in 1948, was the railway which ran through Thorpe on the Hill from Lincoln to Newark. The old station site was at Thorpe's level crossing on Station Road with the Railway Inn opposite

Technically, just outside Thorpe's parish in The photo shows the crossing keeper, Mrs Widworth



and the Stationmaster's house on the other side of the road. The former Goods Yard is now the site of Alpha Concrete's operations. The original brick-built weighbridge cabin, now in a very dilapidated condition (but, surely, worthy of some TLC and preservation?), still stands at the entrance, which is just over the railway crossing on the right as you go towards Whisby Crossroads.

Whilst Station Road had a 'proper' signal box (on the left on the Thorpe side next to what is now the Railway Inn's car park), the level crossing over Eagle Lane west of Thorpe beyond Eric East Lake and turning to Scotland Farm) only had the little hut with the levers to operate the signals (called a Ground Frame) as shown in the picture. The gates would have been opened and shut by hand - all day and night! The house by the railway (on the left just after crossing the railway when going to Eagle from Thorpe) was the original house provided by the Midland Railway for the crossing keeper. Later, in British Railways' time, a new bungalow was built (on the right just before the crossing) to replace the old one. Both are now of course privately owned as all the crossings were automated with automatic barriers in c. 1986 and personnel were no longer required to operate them.

Interestingly, further along the line at Swinderby Station, the old signal box and arrangement still survives, with the signalman operating the levers inside the box and then having to come out of his cab to shut and open the gates - again, any time of the day or night when a train was due! A somewhat incongruous scene in this modern age when the latest, state of the art LNER Lincoln -Kings Cross train comes by.



Apparently, the Midland Railway Trust acquired the levers (German pattern turnover levers, we are told) from this crossing (and from the next level crossing towards Newark at Eagle Barnsdale), presumably when the crossings were automated with automatic barriers. The photo shows the crossing keeper, Mrs Widworth operating the crossing on 30th May 1972.

Solar Farm Update & Action Group

The PC convened a public meeting in It was well attended and the discussions productive. The agenda was as follows:

- Explain the background to the proposed development.
- To set out the benefits and disadvantages of the development to residents.
- To explain the Parish Council's position on the development.
- To help residents decide their own position on the development.
- To consider actions for residents who do decide to oppose the development.

Representatives from several of the affected local villages to the south of TOTH have met in the last few months to co-ordinate responses to the proposal. Other groups who are opposing similar schemes elsewhere in the county have also been contacted. They recommended setting up an Action Group, independently of Parish Councils, and made up of active residents who can be more agile and responsive to time pressures, than typical PC's. Such a group would be able to hold a bank account and to raise money to pay for leaflet drops, a website, posters, and potentially external professional expertise.



Dear Friends,

As you know we have a great team who work very hard in maintaining our churchyard as a place of beauty, and where families can go to remember loved ones who have gone before. Our aim is to make the churchyard one that honours the departed, but is also a symbol of new life and hope, hence the tremendous work on the wildflower meadow.

Part of this work also involves maintaining the churchyard within the guidelines set by the Church of England, guidelines that we are expected to follow. In reviewing these recently we realised, that, with all that has been going on over the past 2-3 years these have slipped a little and in the coming months we will need to get on top of these.

The main areas that we need to address are:-

1. Artificial flowers are only allowed between October and March, and must be cleared by the end of March. From next March any such items that are not removed, we will remove from graves.

2. A number of people are leaving ornaments, mementos on graves as a semi-permanent memorial. Sadly, unless they are ones that have appropriate permission, either via myself, or a Faculty signed by the Diocesan Chancellor, technically they are not allowed. However, we do recognise that so often it is important to express our love for a departed loved one, that we accept such outpourings are important. To facilitate those expressions of love we suggest that any mementos be removed after two months from the funeral, again if family are unable to do so we will remove those items, obviously with respect and dignity.

Please could you help us with adhering to these regulations we are guided by, so that we can maintain the churchyard as a special place of beauty.

Whisby Nature Reserve & Education Centre

Well, it's safe to say that the weather has not only been a challenge for us all over the last few months. The kind of continually stormy and wet weather we saw throughout the latter half of 2023 also has some dire effects on the natural world as well as our own.

You may notice a number of stress points showing in nature as you walk around green spaces, from fallen trees taken out by high winds and deluges of rain to masses and masses of deceased earthworms being visible at the surface of sodden ground. Our wardens have been hard at work making sure the nature reserve is as accessible for people as possible, digging drainage channels to clear paths of standing water and repairing large holes. But while the absurd weather can cause problems, we've also been able to see more positive seasonal aspects of nature in all its glory. While absent last winter, the murmurations returned in December boasting dancing flocks of Starling murmuration seen over Grebe Lake dur Starlings some 25,000 strong. time have been blessed with sightings of Bitterns around Grebe Lake and a Great White Egret has also frequented Thorpe Lake throughout the winter so far.

We've also had a great end to the year for our education and engagement work. We celebrated 75 years of Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust in 2023. And in true form our Junior Wardens celebrated both the anniversary and the end of their year of hard work in style with fancy dress and games. Their 2023 programme was put together with them, as is the 2024 programme, as we engage and encourage our young people to be part of shaping their own experiences and training. If you know any young people aged between 11 and 18 who want to develop practical skills in protecting nature

then point them towards our website or get in touch with our team here to join our ranks.

However, good things aren't just behind us but also coming up, and not just for the kids. We're proud to announce that we'll be hosting monthly training courses from Whisby Education Centre to teach adults specialist nature-based skills, from Hazel Coppicing and Tree Identification to Sustainable Foraging and Wood Whittling. All details for how to book onto our upcoming courses and workshops can be found on the events page of the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust's website (see below).

There's so much to come here at Whisby in 2024 so we're looking forward to seeing you here for our fabulous events and to see the splendid spectacles.
