Book 57 **Grey Bees by Andrey Kurkov** (7.0/10)

(23rd February, 2024)



The wikipedia website says:

"Originally published in 2018, it was translated by Boris Dralyuk and published in English in 2020 and 2022. This novel has "elements of both the fable and the epic", and it dramatises the conflict in Ukraine through the adventures of a beekeeper."

And from the Times Literary Supplement website:

"Translated by Boris Dralyuk with sensitivity and ingenuity, Grey Bees centres on Sergey's journey, beehives in tow, from his home in the "grey zone" between the frontlines in Donbas to Crimea, where he seeks out his old friend and fellow beekeeper, Akhtem. Sergey is at once a war-weary adventurer and a fairy-tale innocent, a cross between Odysseus and a Slavic holy fool. As he overcomes various obstacles, from tonymagri949@btinternet.com traumatized Ukrainian veterans to Russian mercenaries and propaganda television crews, his naive gaze allows Kurkov to get to the heart of

a country bewildered by crisis and war, but where kindness can still be found."

I was unable to attend this meeting so my thanks to Zoë for the following:

We scored Bees 7 and people were largely positive and liked:

- · the linear narrative no more to/fro time-splitting!
- that it managed to tell its story without being too bleak
- how we felt invested in the characters and wanted good outcomes
- the wry humour helped to frame the war - frenemies, the shoes, the car with no windows, changing street names on a whim
- how isolated communities fared in these situations, and the strength of neighbourhood
- the bees!

But we also felt it somehow normalised some aspects of war and poked fun at it at times, and there were some tense moments in the journey to Russia across borders. Others felt frustrated at the episodic style of writing which didn't 'go' anywhere.

Overall another lovely afternoon, hosted by Nick and his Chatsworth House Cake which went down a treat.

The next book is A Man Called Ove by Frederik Backman.




Gaining an education is the only way anyone can work their way out of the slums & an education once acquired can never be taken away.

Spring Spotters Guide to Whisby

Spring is already in the air at Whisby Nature Reserve with the Black-headed Gulls filling the air with their raucous calls, I think it sounds like they're laughing at us, Chiffchaffs are "chiffchaffing" from various hidden perches, Oyster Catchers are flying over shouting "P'tEEP!" to anyone who will listen, and the flowers are starting to bloom. Over the next few months the Reserve will start to come to life each day, here are some of the things you might spot...

April

March and April are the months of sunshine flowers with most flowering plants being either yellow or white. This is because the flowers are adapted to be attractive to the species that pollinate them, in early spring that's mainly flies who lack a large spectrum of colour vision. White and yellow reflect plenty of light which will draw the

pollinators in. The sides of the Pike Drain on Coot and Grebe Lake will shortly be full of Lesser Celandine blooms. These flowers close tightly in bad weather and open in the sunshine, hopefully we'll get to see them in the sunshine.

Last year was a really good year for Cowslips, and we saw more on the Reserve than we've ever seen before. To prevent these delicate flow-



ers being trample we might rope off some verges and small meadows so that they can bloom and set seed.



Many of our nesting birds will arrive throughout March and April adding to the song you'll hear out and about. Here at Whisby we have a large collection of Warblers so listen out for Willow Warblers, Blackcaps, Reed Warblers and Garden Warblers around the Reserve.


In May our meadows start to kick off for the season and you'll see plenty of plants starting to make their dash for the sun! Don't forget to look for the small plants like Changing Forget-me-not or tiny Bird's-foot up on the Sandhills.

Towards the end of the month and into June Orchids will start to make their appearance Starting with Bee

> and Southern Marshorchids then follow-

ing onto Common Spotted-orchids in June.

best place at Whisby to look out for Bee Orchids is the bridge over the railway line where they pop up under the fence, but these disturbance loving orchids have a habit of popping up in the most unlikely of places so keep your eyes peeled when you're out and about!



and more songsters add their voices to the chorus culminating in International Dawn Chorus Day on Sunday 5th of May. We will be running a guided walk at Whisby on this date to celebrate the return of our songbirds and share them with you. 
Fosse Green Solar Farm

Residents Survey February 2024

Following the public meeting that was held in early January, a small group of residents met to explore setting up an Action Group to oppose the proposed Solar Farm. Before proceeding it was agreed that we should seek the views of villagers by asking them directly.

A house-to-house survey was conducted and 196 of the approximate 230 house-holds in the village were canvassed. Of these, 137 households were available and provided a response.

The results are summarised in the pie chart below and showed 76% of residents were opposed to the proposed development with the remaining 24% undecided, or in favour.



Most residents stressed they were not opposed in principle to solar panels, and recognised the need to respond to the climate crisis. But the sheer scale of the proposed development and its consumption of productive farmland close to villages is of great concern.



Dear Friends,

As you know we have a great team who work very hard in maintaining our churchyard as a place of beauty, and where families can go to remember loved ones who have gone before. Our aim is to make the churchyard one that honours the departed, but is also a symbol of new life and hope, hence the tremendous work on the wildflower meadow.

Part of this work also involves maintaining the churchyard within the guidelines set by the Church of England, guidelines that we are expected to follow. In reviewing these recently we realised, that, with all that has been going on over the past 2-3 years these have slipped a little and in the coming months we will need to get on top of these.

The main areas that we need to address are:-

- 1. Artificial flowers are only allowed between October and March, and must be cleared by the end of March. From next March any such items that are not removed, we will remove from graves.
- 2. A number of people are leaving ornaments, mementos on graves as a semi-permanent memorial. Sadly, unless they are ones that have appropriate permission, either via myself, or a Faculty signed by the Diocesan Chancellor, technically they are not allowed. However, we do recognise that so often it is important to express our love for a departed loved one, that we accept such outpourings are important. To facilitate those expressions of love we suggest that any mementos be removed after two months from the funeral, again if family are unable to do so we will remove those items, obviously with respect and dignity.

Please could you help us with adhering to these regulations we are guided by, so that we can maintain the churchyard as a special place of beauty.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 17th JANUARY 2024

The latest financial report was approved.

- Fosse Green Energy: It was agreed that, following the public meeting, a further meeting of interested residents would be arranged to determine whether a local action group was viable.
- Repairs to the Bowls Pavilion are progressing on schedule.
- It was resolved to set the Precept for the financial year 2024/25 at £25350.00 which is an increase of 1.33% for a Band D property which equates to £1.24.
- It was resolved to transfer £50,000.00 (fifty thousand pounds) to the new savings account with Unity Trust Bank to comply with the Financial Services Compensation Scheme.
- It was resolved to adopt the Publication Scheme as circulated to all Parish Councillors.
- The contract for the ORPMR extension has been awarded, pending the receipt of references, to The Todds Group which is a local company.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 6th MARCH 2024 (Minutes not yet formally approved)

A member of the public asked what the council's position was on potholes in village roads, as a visitor to his house had suffered considerable damage to his vehicle by driving through a deep pothole concealed by recent rainfall. The Chair explained that village roads were not a direct responsibility of the PC and that, therefore, no official position had been adopted. The resident stated that all village matters should be of interest to the PC. Local Councillors from NKDC and LCC confirmed the direct responsibility was with LCC highways and offered the resident advice on compensation claims.

The latest financial report was approved.

- An application will be made to add an additional Parish Councillor to the Unity Trust Bank list of authorised signatories.
- The amended allotments risk assessment will be circulated for discussion and adoption at the next meeting.
- The allotment terms and conditions as circulated to all Parish Councillors were adopted.

- The PC will apply for a free portrait of King Charles.
- The Publication Scheme was adopted.
