The Colony by Audrey Magee (8.1/10)

(7th June, 2024)



This book, chosen by Shirley, was very popular with the group(8.1/10) and there were many positive comments made during our discussion. It covers themes of small communities, colonisation, family, loss of language, loss of a way of life, having to adapt to survive, tourism, the Troubles and more. It is set on a tiny, unnamed island off the west coast of Ireland.

James and his mother, Mairéad (locals) were the most compelling characters, while Mr Lloyd and Masson (the visitors) were universally disliked because of their selfishness, arrogance and manipulation of the islanders (the Colony) for personal gain.

The book has an unusual structure but is beautifully presented, well written and imaginative. The descriptions of the island are vivid and the characters are well drawn. It was an excellent choice.



Avoiding the fish (or rabbit), cabbage and potatoes which dominated every evening meal in the book, Shirley provided an imaginative table of refreshments based on the more palatable parts of the islanders' diet. Jam sandwiches and scones figured prominently on the island and were very popular at the meeting. (When did you last have a jam sandwich?). There was a lot of whisky drinking too, but only by the islanders, not at our meeting. Thank you, Shirley, for your excellent hospitality and generosity.

Love your Parish - Jamie's Legacy

Jamie's Legacy... what do they support?

We were approached by VFTH asking if we could share broader detail on the activities that Jamie's Legacy coordinates in our son's memory to help deprived children in Uganda as Sylvia had only learnt about them having recently sponsored a child.

smile.... this time those who had been born into by extreme poverty & have nothing through no fault of their own.

Providing the school sponsorship scheme has evolved over the past 3 years with 75+ children now being supported with education & daily nutritional hot meals. 12 of these are through TOTH residents & our village church.

So, what other support does Jamie's Legacy provide? Jamie's Helping Hand Club provides families in most extreme difficulty that are unable to feed their children with essential groceries. Currently 3 different families are supported each month & we have 7 kind ladies in the JHH club donating £10 a month making this possible.

Multiple fresh water pipes have been installed around the slums plus 2 large water tanks into local schools ensuring children & families can access fresh water rather than the local stream that causes disease.

New mattresses supplied as children sleep on the floor with rugs or old pieces Children experience birthday parties & cakes for the first time in their lives & the Legacy provides toys & funding for an annual party at Christmas.

The Jamie's Legacy Football Tournament is held each year & funds provided to arrange a day trip to the zoo & lake beach for disabled children who rarely leave their homes.

Families in appalling living conditions (that flood) have been re-homed & a number of families have been supported to start up micro businesses (ie food stalls, soap making) so they become self-sustainable to support their own fam-





Gulls and Orchids

It's been an exciting month for us on the reserve, with lots of wonderful things going on. Firstly, our Black-headed Gull colony returned to Whisby for breeding this year after Bird Flu in 2023. You may remember that last year the variant of Bird flu hit Black-headed Gull colonies particularly hard, the year before it was Gannets and other seabirds, each year brings a new strain that has the potential to target another group, last year it was the turn of Black-headed Gulls across the country. From our normal 720 nesting pairs we dropped to 228 nests in 2023 with fewer still surviving to fledge young, the reserve was eerily quiet for those of us used to the cacophony of the Gulls. However, they have returned this year, bouncing back with 541 occupied nests and plenty of youngsters making their voices heard in the soundtrack of Whisby. We are curious as to if these birds were away from the colonies last year and didn't contract the virus, if they contracted it and have survived, or if some of them have natural immunity, we're sure there are scientific studies going on to explore these issues as there were in Gannets in the past few years - did you know that Gannets who have survived Bird Flu have black irises instead of vivid blue?



But the most exciting event in the Gull colony this year isn't just a good recovery from Bird Flu, we've had some unexpected visitors. Mediterranean Gulls are amber listed birds in the UK, and we know that we have a small number of them around Whisby, dropping in from time to time. These birds don't like disturbance and will often nest well out of the way of humans, but a pair have chosen to nest on the Islands on Thorpe Lake. This in itself is not surprising, they've attempted to nest here before but have abandoned the nest long before the eggs hatch. However, this year we had an unexpected sighting, our Wildlife Barn Volunteers spotted a chick late in June. This chick has done well on the islands and is currently as I type (9th July) about 2/3 the size of its parent and molting into juvenile plumage. We hope to observe this chick fledging in a few weeks, we've already made history with this pair hatching a chick, hopefully we can cement it with junior flying off into the world.

It's also been a bit of a bumper year for some of our Orchids. Southern Marsh-orchids had a disappointing season, but the Bee and Pyramidal Orchids which followed, flowering in June had another story to tell. Around the reserve Bee Orchids have lined the paths, especially on Magpie Walk. We will wait until we are sure that all these plants have mature seed before we think about cutting the verges, did you know that each orchid seed pod can hold thousands of minute seeds? And some of our Bee Orchids have up to 10 pods, that's a lot of seed to spread around!





Our Pyramidal Orchids have had a recordbreaking year, going from a single plant in 2003 to 292 in one meadow in 2024. The increase in these plants shows that our habitat management is having the desired effect, they wouldn't grow if conditions weren't right for them. There's also a fair amount of luck involved, the soil and it's fungal populations have also got to be right for orchids to even germinate, let alone flower. cause the seeds are so small they don't have the parcel of energy that other seeds have to jump start them into germination, instead they form a relationship with a particular fungus which provides the seed with the nutrients it requires for growth, so that these orchids are spreading shows the good conditions of our soils and the presence of their preferred type of fungi.

We've also had one Pyramidal Orchid pop up in a new location, maybe in 20 years the reserve will be covered in these showy orchids.

Proposed Development of Sub-Station at Navenby



Bicker Fen sub-station near Boston (similar size to the proposed Navenby project)

Around 200 people, largely residents from the cliff villages, attended the Public Meeting at The Venue in Navenby on 8 July 2024 to discuss the proposed development of a Sub-Station linking the outputs from Solar Parks at Springwell and Fosse Green. The sub-station, if approved, will be sited on Navenby Heath approximately 1km from houses, off Green Man Lane.

A short series of presentations was followed by a lively Q&A. A copy of the main presentation can be accessed through this link: https://thorpe-hill.parish.lincolnshire.gov.uk/

The proposed sub-station is critical to the feasibility of the two proposed large solar farms. Without its approval the schemes will be unable to connect to the grid and thus export power. The sole justification for the sub-station is to provide an electrical connection for these proposed developments. The Groups who oppose the solar farms therefore recognise the imperative of opposing the sub-station, because if it is approved, it will in all likelihood become near impossible to oppose the solar farms.

The chief concerns are the impact on Landscape, Habitat, Environment, Agriculture, Scale of Development and comparisons with Bicker Fen (see photo). Additional points were raised by residents including: security of food supplies, safety & environmental issues, the new Government's policy approach to renewables and the potential impact on this development.

The Next Steps include testing out community reaction, developing next set of actions, and attending National Grid's proposed consultation event on 27 September 2024 – further details to be provided when confirmation received.

Thorpe on the Hill - Parish Council

There have been two meeting since the last edition of VFTH

Parish Council Meeting May 29th

- Councillor Lyons proposed Councillor Bindley to be elected as Chair, which was agreed by all, and the declaration of office signed.
- Councillor Bindley proposed Councillor Lyons to be elected as Vice-Chair which was agreed by all and the declaration of office signed.
- District Councillor Peter Overton gave his report of the last 12 months discussing the solar farm project, new relief road, climate change and housing. NKDC had no further updates regarding the solar farm application.
- Finance reports were approved.
- Councillor Lyons recommended forming a working group to discuss the future of the bookings for the hall and determine its purpose and whether it should predominantly be for use by parishioners or if the hall should be utilised as a potential income generator. It was agreed to carry on with the working party formed during the renovation discussions.

Parish Council Meeting July 10th

- Finance reports were approved.
- An order has been placed for a new projector for the hall.
- An order has been placed for a larger combined waste and dog waste bin, following a parishioner request.
- There was a discussion on creating a new position for the gate into the playground. Decision deferred until the September meeting.
- There sound reverberations in the hall were discussed. There is clearly an unforeseen problem which is creating an echo effect, making conversation in a full hall difficult. The Chair and Clerk were asked to investigate solutions and bring a costed proposal to the September meeting.
- There was a discussion on the possibility of creating an annual community award scheme.
 It was agreed that the parish council would not pursue this idea.
- Councillor Lyons and Councillor Sheldon updated the meeting on the ongoing development
 of the environmental connectivity scheme they are pursuing with Doddington Hall and other
 interested parties.

Fosse Green Energy

The Parish Council survey showed that most residents are opposed to the Fosse Green Energy Solar development. The fact that the new Secretary of State, Ed Miliband, has already approved three enormous solar power stations, Sunnica, Mallard Pass and Gate Burton, is therefore not good news. But the Parish Council will continue to do everything it can to oppose the FGE development and, even if it is granted consent, fight for mitigations in the design and a proper community compensation fund.


