Love your Parish - Letter Boxes

Do we have a Woolly Delinquent in our village? Or a Yarn Bomber?

You will have seen the post box toppers appearing on top of the post box at the east end of Lincoln Lane. Post box toppers are designed as a tribute, commemoration, or just for or public enjoyment. During the pandemic they were used to pay tribute to NHS and Postal workers, and since then for Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee, and in September 2022 as a tribute upon her death.

A spokesperson for the Royal Mail said "We first began to see these toppers in 2012 over the festive season, although this soon spread to other key times of the year such as Easter.



In March 2023, the journalist Jan Moir branded those who make post box toppers as "Woolly Delinquents," a label that the topper community, also known as "Yarn Bombers", has embraced.

Seasonal toppers for Christmas and other events are particularly popular as we have seen.

We know how important it is for little ones to try different foods, so alongside our usual biscuits, we'll now be offering a piece of fruit at snack time. It's a great way to introduce new





Love your Parish - ThReds Walking Group

Walk 68

(A Valentine's Day Walk with Kissing Gates, Friday, 14th February, 2025)

When I chose the date for this walk the challenge was to find a route with Kissing Gates.

If you're not familiar with these gates, they allow walkers through but not livestock. The gate in the picture, hinged on the left, moves between the two posts and "kisses" these at each end of its travel.



I managed to find a circular route of almost five miles which took us from the Doddington Hall Car Park, out towards Harby, back towards Skellingthorpe and then back to Doddington. We crossed 3 Kissing Gates. If you're able to walk on the Doddington estate you are likely to encounter the wonderfully coloured Lincolnshire Red cattle and, possibly, a small herd of Exmoor ponies. Although the Lincolnshire Reds are raised for beef they're allowed to behave like a wild herd, as are the Exmoor ponies, as part of the rewilding process happening on the estate.



As you can see from the photograph, we had a good time and many of the group went on to enjoy a hearty lunch at the Railway.

The next walk is on Wednesday, 16th April.

ThReds (Thorpe Residents) was started in 2015 ie 10 years ago. The Walking Group is part of ThReds and we'll be celebrating our 10th anniversary on Wednesday, 11th June. We will be 'Beating the Bounds' by walking part of the historic and current parish boundaries. There will be a route of a couple of miles which can be extended to 5 for the more energetic. Hopefully, this will suit all abilities. We will have a celebratory lunch at the Railway following this anniversary walk.

The Eric East Lake

200 Blue Tits

February 2021. Every year, in January, take the top off each box to see if it has been used and then, if necessary, clear out the old nest for hygiene reasons. So far, every box has been used every year and there has been very little evidence of chick mortality. Given a typical blue tit brood size



(8-10), it would be reasonable to assume that we've raised 50 blue tit chicks each year, making 200 in total. Obviously, many will not have survived their first or second year but 200 is a good starting point to maintain a healthy population.

Spring Bulbs

It has been another successful year for the spring bulbs, with snowdrops, Tenby daffodils and aconites putting on good displays. At the time of writing the wild garlic, bluebells and wood anemones are making their presence known. I couldn't resist including another aconite picture. This one just opened itself up to the full sun.



Wild Flower Meadows

We have planted thousands of wildflower seeds over the years with zero success. The forward my slides to a member of the PC and dream of having two or three small wildflower another member asked if I was prepared to meadows has failed.

Community Orchard

I made a successful application to NKDC for 5 fruit trees with stakes, ties and biodegradable The 6 blue tit nest boxes were first put up in guards, all of which have been made available through the Coronation Living Heritage Fund. The bare rooted trees arrived in early March and were planted by volunteers who have each adopted a tree. They agreed to plant and water their tree and generally keep an eye on it over the first few years. These trees have formed a small community orchard on the eastern side of the lake in an open area which



was originally earmarked to be a wildflower meadow (see above). We have planted an Ellison's Orange apple, a Bramley apple, a Conference pear, a Beth pear and a Czar plum.

Thank you to all the tree-adopters.

Single Specimen Tee

I also made a successful application for a single specimen tree from the same fund. The tree, an oak, will be planted in the smaller area intended for wild flowers but I have not yet received details of collection from Metheringham. Presentation to Eagle and Swinethorpe Parish Council

On Thursday, 20th March I made a presentation to our neighbouring Parish Council to explain what we did as a WFC. I was asked to make the presentation to a wider audience of residents. Obviously I agreed to both of these things and I saw this as a positive outcome. Fingers crossed.

The highlight this year was actually seeing a lamb being born.



Hello,

As I sit in my study writing these notes it is a misty March morning, after a week of unseasonably bright and warm weather this was a shock to the system.

At the end of April we will celebrate Easter, as I explained a few months ago Easter moves because of the differences in solar and lunar calendars.

Easter for me is about a hope that knows no bounds, that even death can nor extinguish that hope. So often we turn hope into a wish list, "I hope for a new car", "I hope for 3 points for the Imps" etc. However, Easter hope is something more than a wish list.

It enables us to confront the reality of life, remember undeservedly we are precious and from that new life can flow. This means we don't see life through rose tinted glasses, but see the realities, and recognise we are called to respond with sensitivity and love.

The whole Holy Week and Easter story sums that up. Jesus is betrayed, crucified, died and yet at the end of it all his disciples were called back to the sense of giving love, not vengeance.

So in our world where geo-politics appears to be on a precipice, the environment fragile, economic wealth unfairly distributed love calls us to name, confront and seek new possibilities. This is based on giving love and not some form of imperialism of state, or a mix of faith based nationalism.

I pray that as a society we can discover this resurrection hope that brings new life for all, knows NO boundaries, and sees flourishing and sharing and not control and domination as the true goals for society.



ThReds Book Club Book 63 The Age of Innocence by Edith Wharton (7/10) Friday, 31st January

It was agreed some time ago that we should read "a classic" and, after a few failed attempts at choosing a title, we finally decided to read Edith Wharton's 'The Age of Innocence'. The following summary of the book is from the Wordsworth Classics website



"Widely regarded as one of Edith Wharton's greatest achievements, The Age of Innocence is not only subtly satirical, but also a sometimes dark and disturbing comedy of manners in its exploration of the 'eternal triangle' of love.

Set against the backdrop of upper-class New York society during the 1870s, the author's combination of powerful prose combined with a thoroughly researched and meticulous evocation of the manners and style of the period, has delighted readers since the novel's first publication in 1920. In 1921 The Age of Innocence achieved a double distinction – it won the Pulitzer Prize and it was the first time this prestigious award had been won by a woman author."

One member of our group said:

"For a novel set in a claustrophobic and stilted world of stuffy plutocrats, a world with which I am entirely unfamiliar, and to which I'm not in the least attracted, and without any real mystery, plot twists, sex, violence, or blasphemy, this novel was revelation. I thought it was exceptional and thoroughly enjoyed it.

Overall rating: 9

(10 needs to be reserved for the very small handful of books that are truly exceptional)"

But this was not the general view at the meeting.

Personally, I had to start the book 4 times before I got into it. I found that the unfamiliar vocabulary and the number of characters meant that the book didn't flow.

Others said

"I struggled with it and haven't finished it" "It was difficult to get into" "I didn't enjoy it" "An odd book. I liked it but didn't like it. I had no emotional attachment to it."

All appreciated the quality Edith Wharton's writing.

The book was chosen by Shirley who enjoyed the book more when reading it for a second time. Shirley also hosted the meeting and rose

to the occasion by providing a glass of champagne on arrival to chime with *"the backdrop* of upper-class New York society during the 1870s", and delicious, American themed food (New York cheesecake, muffins etc). Thank you Shirley.

Rooted, Strong and Flexible

In Five Element theory we are entering Spring, a time of new growth, creativity, of purpose and possibility. We are moving from the yin energy of the winter through the rising yang of spring to-wards the maximum yang of summer – already the days are lengthening, birds are active and we are seeing buds everywhere.

For me a marker of spring is the return of ospreys, stunning fish eating birds of prey, which had been hunted to extinction in Victorian times



for hat feathers, and thanks to hard work from Wildlife Trusts across the UK, now travel from Gambia each spring to nest here. The day Maya, the resident female at Rutland Water, returned to her Manton Bay nest, we learned the "Osprey" form.

Thorpe on the Hill was represented at a world first in February, when I took part in a Shiatsu Symposium in Brussels. There were 60 delegates representing 22 European countries, all sharing skills ,knowledge and experience in raising the profile of shiatsu. One interesting fact is that at one thousand hours of learning our UK practitioners top the table in terms of training – so far its only Austria who has a degree programme. The meeting was conducted in English, but before we came home we joined a qi gong class in Flemish. It was translated for us and I was very amused that even in different languages the qi gong jokes are the same!

We have Shiatsu Awareness month (SAM) coming up in June – this year the focus is on "Grassroots" shiatsu – which is exactly what we do at Selfcare Saturdays. If you were able to attend all five during the year you would have learned 15 acupressure points to use to support the health of you and your family.

Thanks to SAM SelfCare Saturday on May 31st will be a free event – watch out for the posters!

Parish Council Meeting 05/03/2025

Summary of minutes

- District & county Cllrs in attendance commented on the Greater Lincolnshire Devolution Project which is currently examining options. More details will be provided once they emerge.
- Cllrs also commented on the forthcoming Mayoral elections in May; residents should expect to receive details directly through the post.
- A copy of the minutes of the previous meeting was approved and signed.
- The Financial Report was agreed and signed. A review of village hall bookings will be prepared and presented to the PC early in the new financial year.
- The plans for VE Day celebrations were discussed and it was agreed that Umbrellas Café in early May will adopt a VE day theme, and the PC agreed to waive the hall hire fee for the occasion to support the event.
- Village Hall:
 - The PC agreed to repaint the wall in the hall and to install a bumper strip to prevent chair backs from marking the walls in the future.
 - PC also agreed to clean the solar panels to try and boost their output.
 - There are still imperfections in the newly laid flooring and members of the PC will meet with the contractor to establish a way forward.
- Tarmac, who own the quarries to the northern side of Eagle Lane, are exploring an option to site floating solar panels on the now disused lakes that they own in order to generate power, largely for their own use. A consultation meeting was held in the village hall recently to explain these proposals. A copy of their planning application can be found on LCC website.
- The land at the Eric East Lake has been registered with the Rural Payments Agency, as part of the wider Lincoln & Witham Valley Landscape Recovery Project. This may enable to PC to benefit from grants in the future.
